Teen Read Week October 12-18

Teen Read Week™ is a national adolescent literacy initiative created by the Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA). It began in 1998 and is held annually during the third week of October. Its purpose is to encourage teens to be regular readers and library users.

Although teens realize the importance of reading, they have a huge menu of activities to choose from when deciding how to spend their free time, and reading gets lost in the shuffle. Reading skills get rusty when they are not used. The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) reports that over the last 20 years there have been only modest gains in reading achievement. And although there are many active literacy campaigns, very few efforts focus on teenagers.

Teens are encouraged to stop by the library to browse the young adult selections available. The library's online catalog, infosoup, (infosoup.org) also has a teen reads page for more recommendations and reviews. **Turn Dreams into Reality** is the theme for Teen Read Week™, October 12-18, 2014.

Rain Garden

Thanks to the Cell Com Grant, and Friends of the Hortonville Library volunteers for planting the new native rain garden that was installed at the North Nash Street entrance to the Municipal Services Center. We would also like to thank Wolfwrath's for the preparation of the garden and to Foxglove Farms Greenhouses for supplying the native plants.



A rain garden is a shallow depression that is planted with deep-rooted native plants and grasses. A rain **garden** should be positioned near a runoff source like a downspout, driveway or sump pump to capture rainwater runoff. The water is carried to our rain garden by a buried pipe that comes from the building's downspout. Rain garden plants need to be able to handle both wet and dry conditions alternately.

Some of the plants in the garden include: Milkweed; Aster; False Indigo; Native Coneflowers; Joe Pye Weed; Prairie Blazing Star Cardinal Lobelia; Blue Lobelia and Black-eyed Susans. It will take about three years before the garden reaches it's maximum potential.
